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IT'S YOUR BID

Aim for a small plus? Invite game? Bid game? Invite slam? Bid slam? Invite a grand? We've got it all in this challenging set.

Congratulations to Bob Katz for his perfect score and to Sandy Birnholtz, Seymour Mandell and Ken Van Cleve for high score among readers.

You too can have it all. Just send in your answers to next issue's hands, found at the end of this article.

1. IMPs. N-S vul. As SOUTH, you hold:

AQ10 ♥AK10 ♦K AKJ8543
WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH
Pass Pass Pass 1♣
Pass 1♦ Pass ?

In modern expert practice, when you open one of a minor, partner responds in one of a suit and you jump to 3NT it shows a semi-solid 6-card suit, stoppers in the unbid suits and about 18 or so HCPs. KJ8xxx doesn't qualify as semi-solid, but we have 2+ stoppers in each major and 20 HCPs. Close enough.

Chuck Burger (3NT): Usually better suit, but best slam try when pard has good clubs and max cards. The club 10 would help if he doesn't.

Joe Chiesa (3NT): Clearly I advertise a more formidable club suit, but life can be unfair and we may yet reach 6♣ as partner will know I have long clubs and a hand too good for 3♣. 2♥ or 2♠ might be irremediable, and to what end? Too good for 2NT, and even I wouldn't bid 3♣!

Sam Hirschman (3NT): I hate making a jump-shift into a major on 3 cards. I hate this less. Maybe a 4-3 major fit would play better, but it's not like I need to try to eke out 420 to beat the 400s.

Marilyn Maddox (3NT): Partner as a passed hand did not bid a major, so I want the lead to come into my hand.

Howard Perlman (3NT): A bit of a distortion as this typically is a semi to solid minor, but the major 10s make this hand too good to chance not getting to game.

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Other ideas:

Julie Arbit (2♥): Partner should not have a 4-card heart suit, and it is the least of evils

Jonathan Fleischmann (2♥): I am usually loath to jumpshift into a three-card major, but I must force to game somehow. 3NT shows a different club suit.

Irv Rosenstein (2NT): I would have bid 3NT with better club spots.

It seems odd to me, but a few panelists said they would have opened 2NT (Suzy Burger, Perlman) or might have (Fleischmann), while Norm Bolton liked the hand so much he would have opened

2♣ and rebid 2NT.

When this hand came up on Bridge Base, partner held scant values: ♠962 ♥92 ♦97432 ♠A76. That, nonetheless, was good enough to manage 9 tricks when clubs ran.

2. MTPTs. Both vul. As SOUTH, you hold:

Partner's passed-hand 1NT overcall shows the two unbid suits. Should be a decent passed hand at the vulnerability, but might be just 5-4 or 4-5, and can't be 5-5 with a good 10 HCPs since partner would have opened with that hand.

So I would be reluctant to go all the way to game, particularly at matchpoints. And I have too much defense to worry about the opponents making a lot of tricks in a black suit. I am worth a strong advance, possibly 3. because

3♥ might be viewed as preemptive.

Staying low:

Julie Arbit $(2 \checkmark)$: I will compete to $3 \checkmark$ if they bid $3 \clubsuit$.

Dick Temkin (2♥): Given partner's opening pass, 1NT should be lighter and possibly more distributional than a takeout double. In any event, I'll try to buy it with 2♥. Double is not in the picture.

Morrie Kleinplatz (2♥): Plenty opposite passed hand. I will decide what to do if they compete further. At matchpoints, I will probably double and aim at 200. My singleton diamond is a negative for game.

Middling:

Gene Benedict (3♥): Invites game, lets partner off the hook with a bad hand.

Irv Rosenstein (3♥): Partner has no more than 3 black cards. My stiff diamond and 4 hearts are pure.

Bob Webber (2♠): Followed by 3♥. Strong game try with spade value.

Jonathan Fleischmann (2♠): This auction has me in murky territory with most partners. I want to encourage game in hearts. Whether partner interprets this as showing the

higher-ranking of his suits or just more stuff in spades than clubs, I have him covered.

Going all the way:

Brenda Bryant (4♥): Tough. I would probably punish partner and bid 4♥.

Don Rumelhart (4♥): I can't imagine a hand where a vulnerable partner would come into an auction where 4♥ doesn't have an excellent play.

Chuck Burger (4♥): Could invite in hearts after a 2♠ bid or 3♣ bid when I correct diamonds to hearts. Partner did not double, but his bid (vul.) showed 5-5 or 5-6. I might even be defending.

Sam Hirschman (4♥): I have great values, so I'm planning on losing something like two clubs and one of something else.

Bob Katz (4♥): Partner should be 5-5 in the red suits with something reasonable when vulnerable. Maybe ♠xx ♥K10xxx ♦KQxxx ♣x.

Marilyn Maddox (4♥): Partner doesn't need much to make game on a cross-ruff.

Joe Chiesa (2♠): I intend to bid 4♥, but want to preclude partner from being brilliant

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and saving over 4♠ or 5♣ as I have an answer to those bids.

When this hand came up on Bridge Base, partner had "committed" (as Edgar Kaplan used to derisively write) the Sandwich NT with ♠Q65 ♥8763 ♠AK743 ♣4. No worries: With Kxx of hearts onside and the queen of spades filling out your holding in that suit, 4♥ sailed home.

3. MTPTs. N-S vul. As SOUTH, you hold:

♠KJ10852 ♥K ♦62 ♣A632 WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH Pass 1♥ Pass 1♠ Pass 2♦ Pass ?

You have 11 HCPs, also known as invitational values, and a good 6-card suit. Conveniently, a jump rebid of 3♠ shows exactly those things.

Gene Benedict (3♠): Invites game, shows a 6-card suit.

Bob Katz (3♠): Shows six pretty good spades and invitational values, which is exactly what I have.

Howard Perlman (3♠): Invita-

tional. Fear a misfit, but 2♠ just seems too conservative.

Don Rumelhart (3♠): Invitational. My lack of a fit with partner's suit prevents me from forcing to game.

Sam Hirschman (3♠): It's not IMPs, thank God. If partner passes, I might be lucky to make 3. My spades are just good enough.

Chuck Burger (3♠): Invitational. The spade 8 got me. Pard will bid game on short spades with good hand, but not bid over 2♠.

Dick Temkin (3♠): Invitational with a good six-card suit. If we belong in NT, partner needs a club card and it may need to play from his side.

Bob Brent (3♠): Going plus at matchpoints. Would go to game at IMPs.

Note that some of the 3\(\rightarrow\) bidders felt they were close to bidding only 2\(\rightarrow\), while others almost decided to force to game. That fits right in with some of the other panelists' answers:

Morrie Kleinplatz (2♠): At matchpoints I will stay low, as I'd rather risk missing game than risk getting a minus. Partner should raise with

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more than a minimum and adequate spade support. But if he has ♠x ♥Axxxx ♠KJxx ♠Kxx, I'll be glad we stopped at the 2-level. At IMPs, I would bid 3♠.

Norm Bolton (3♣): Let's find out what's going on.

Marilyn Maddox (4♠): Too good to just invite.

Joe Chiesa (3♣): Don't do this at home if you have misallied with a partner who opens "good" 9-counts. Although the hand may only be invitational, I am forcing as 2NT misaligns NT (Qx of clubs opposite), and 3♠ may fetch a pass where partner is short in spades and we have 9 tricks at NT.

4. IMPs. None vul. As SOUTH, you hold:

The barrage by the oppo-

nents has left us in a tough spot since we have slam-invitational values (or out-and-out slam values if we have a fit) and are not sure what suit or notrump to play in. Let the guessing begin.

Sam Hirschman (3NT): I have the spade stopper. Partner probably has some mediocre 12-count, so I'm not worried about missing a slam (though sometimes I'll be cold for 6♣ and go down in 3NT).

Bob Katz (3NT): Partner could have most anything and yet not have a good enough hand to bid over 3♠. Maybe a 2-4-5-2 hand, for example. On these types of auctions, you just cannot worry about a heart stopper.

Howard Perlman (3NT): It's heavy, might make a slam, but it's my last chance. Wish I could bid an invitational 4NT.

Julie Arbit (4NT): Should be quantitative, and partner will rate club honors highly in evaluating his hand.

Bob Cappelli (4NT): This hand may well make 6♣, but I am going to make the quantitative bid of 4NT.

Chuck Burger (4NT): Blackwood. Pass with 0, or bid 6♣ with 1 or 2 and expect to

catch 2+ clubs. I like 4♣ if forcing. Too good for 3NT, which could be best.

Marilyn Maddox (4NT): Willing to take a chance partner could have either A or J of clubs.

Willie Winokur (4NT): Vanilla variety.

Gene Benedict (4♠): I hope 3♠ established a game-force. Partner's next bid will clear things up.

Norm Bolton (4♣): Too much potential for slam to bid a dull 3NT.

Bob Brent (6♣): May miss a grand but partner's pass indicates minimum values. Partner should have some clubs as he is short in spades.

Suzy Burger (4♠): Looking for minor slam. Will raise either minor to 6.

CANDIDATES WANTED

Joe Chiesa (4♣): Ace of hearts KQ of diamonds and Jx of clubs makes 6♣, or we may have a diamond slam. 4♣ describes my hand and keeps all contracts in play. If 3NT is our last plus, mea culpa.

Jonathan Fleischmann (4♣): Natural and forcing. I expect to play this hand in a club or notrump slam so that my spade holding is protected.

Morrie Kleinplatz (DbI): Just too good for 3NT. Over 4♣ or 4♦ I will bid 4♠. Over 4♥, I will bid 5♣, which should suggest clubs with diamond tolerance and at least interest in slam.

Don Rumelhart (4♠): I think that slam is extremely likely. 4♠ tells partner this and asks him to describe his hand further.

Irv Rosenstein (4♠): Let partner tell me more about his hand. We should have a play for 6♠ or 6♠.

Dick Temkin (6♣): if we give EW the spade KJ, it's hard to construct a hand for partner that doesn't have a decent or better play for this. Not bidding 5NT for minors: No way he'd expect a 3-7 hand.

Sheldon Kirsch (5NT): Pick a slam...and I hope he picks clubs.

Some comments on the above comments:

- Assuming the opponents have 9+ spades as advertised, partner almost has to have at least two clubs. Otherwise he is 2-4-6-1 and probably would have bid 4◆ over 3♠. With 2+ clubs opposite, we are worth a shot at slam.
- That slam should be 6♣, which will play easily. We should not be offering partner a choice of strain.
- Unless you have a special agreement, 4NT is Blackwood, probably RKC for clubs
 the only suit you have shown.
- Notice how good it is here to play regular RKC rather than 1430: First of all, the zero response to 1430 commits you to slam off two aces. And whether partner thinks it is RKC or regular Black, you'll get a response you can understand.

When this hand came up on Bridge Base, partner held: ♠K ♥10754 ♦K109876 ♣AJ. Ace of diamonds-x-x-Q, followed by the finesse against the jack — the standard "Restricted Choice" play, made even more likely than usual to succeed because East is known to be long in spades — brought in 6♣ for a 10-IMP pickup.

5. MTPTs. N-S vul. As SOUTH, you hold:

I slightly demoted double because of the strong majority for bidding a slam.

That doesn't mean I'm confident about 6♥ making: There's the danger of a diamond ruff, and quite possibly a bad trump break. But we have an awful lot of material opposite partner's presumed 17+ points (or equivalent playing strength) to give up on slam.

Brenda Bryant (6♥): I am nervous hearts are bad. But partner must either have a good hand or 5-5 or 6-5 in the majors.

Sam Hirschman (6♥): Partner bid 4♥ when I showed 8+ points with four hearts and nothing more. We should make this. I have the minors

fairly well covered. Might go down on ace of diamonds and a diamond ruff.

Dick Temkin (6♥): Even if we have all the key cards, suits rate to be breaking badly, so I'll settle for six.

Gene Benedict (6♥): We could be off the ace of diamonds.

Morrie Kleinplatz (6♥): (Second choice, 6♣.) The hand makes me nervous (diamond ace and a ruff), but the odds favour slam. If I bid 6♣ and partner bids 6+ we may have a grand. Still, the heart weakness worries me. Partner might be bidding on shape: **♥**K10xxx AQJxxx **♦**Ax ♣void, in which case we have a likely heart loser. Since there is no room to find all this out, 6♥ leaves them in the blind, and even with a ruff coming RHO might not lead the unsupported ace.

I definitely disagree with one part of the previous answer: East will lead the ace of diamonds about 110 percent of the time that he has it. (N.B., I didn't take the "u" out of Morrie's "favour" since he is from south of the Detroit River, eh.)

I'm not crazy about the idea of cue-bidding, which is basically an effort to get to 7♥.

Our trumps are too thin for that. Also 5\(\) ought to show first-round control, which we don't have.

Norm Bolton (5♦): Worth a cue.

Suzy Burger (5♦): Slam invitational.

Irv Rosenstein (6♣): Casting a rosy glow over the auction [Another Edgar Kaplan quote; see the last issue of Table Talk–M.H.]. Should be able to make at least 6♥.

Sheldon Kirsch (6♣): Might be a grand slam here.

Marilyn Maddox (6♣): On the way to 6♥. Doesn't cost anything to show club ace.

Don Rumelhart (6♣): Grand slam try. Partner will need to infer that I don't have first-round control of diamonds or spades, but should assume that I don't have two losers in either suit.

I'd be nervous about risking the following bid:

Jonathan Fleischmann (5♠): I don't fancy defending at these colors. Trumps are set since I promised hearts for my double, so 5♠ should be control-showing.

These panelists won't run

into a ruff, but they could go down multiple tricks:

Myles Maddox (6NT): Hearts don't figure to split favorably. Should be a squeeze on East and West.

Joe Chiesa (6♣): I don't have to live in Copenhagen to know there is something rotten in the state of Denmark. I intuit partner may have a minimum opener with 6-5, 5-6 or 5-5 in the majors. Although I secretly believe double is best, I will bid 6♣ as I have a 16-count when I could have a 6count...I am not playing 6♥ or 7♥ on a 4-4 fit as suits may not split well. Shooting for 6NT. If partner bids 6♦ I should bid 7♥ as partner has heard the auction, knows I have but four hearts and, on a good day, will know how many hearts he has.

The doublers:

Julie Arbit (DbI): I'm terrible at matchpoints, but with things breaking badly I'd rather defend.

Willie Winokur (Dbl): And lead a club. Can we make a slam with everything foul? If we can, my bid is bad.

Bob Cappelli (Dbl): Don't think we have enough trumps, but if partner pulls, I must con-

sider whether to bid 6♥.

Chuck Burger (DbI): Since pass isn't forcing. If pard is 6-5 or 5-6, he may pull. Otherwise I'm looking at a club and a diamond [loser] or diamond ruff and bad suit breaks, if that matters.

Pass ought to be forcing, since partner's jump to game presumably announced that this is our hand. Apparently agreeing with me on this point is a frequent Burger partner:

Howard Perlman (Pass): Intend to play at least 6, but maybe partner has a diamond void? Would bid a grand over partner's 5♦, and if partner passes LHO's correction [to 5♦, I guess—M.H.] I would bid 6♣ giving him another chance.

More doublers:

Bob Brent (Dbl): Our suits are going to break badly. Taking a small plus, hopefully.

Funny. If I doubled I'd be hoping for a large plus.

Bob Webber (DbI): Slam is unclear with bad splits certain. Unless East has a sixth club, we may hold them to four clubs and the ace of diamonds.

At the other table, West led A♦, then J♦-Q-K-7. East next returned a club. Declarer cashed two clubs, throwing a diamond from dummy before leading a trump. Making 4, so our team won 10 IMPs.

You can draw your own conclusions about my choice of lead and continuation, and about whether East at the other table should figure out from the J+ to return a trump instead of a club.

Letter: No points for online play

To the Editor:

You are one of the MI bridge players I truly admire, but I feel a need to rebut your editorial on the first two pages of the March 2015 issue of Table Talk.

I am one of the players who is on the opposite end of the pendulum on this issue from you. I feel that online bridge is similar to party bridge, fun and social, but does not have the elements of tournament play that merit masterpoints.

I enjoy playing with friends online occasionally, especially because we are limited by much distance and this makes for great opportunities to spend time playing 'bridge with friends.' I especially like watching World events and competitions that BBO broadcasts which enable kibitzers to learn from and hear discussions about the many interesting hands shown.

I recently found several club masterpoint certificates from 1993 that I had neglected to turn in to the ACBL. This finding gave me the opportunity to note how hard I worked at these club games to come in the top 5 pairs to earn partial points — always playing at

least 24 boards a session. One of the certificates showed a club championship at which there were 10 tables and my partner & I placed third, earning .33.

Yes, masterpoints are easier to come by at local clubs and tournaments today than they were 30 years ago, but online, they're almost meaningless. As you stated, people can play less than an hour or 12 hands and amass points. And there is good reason to discuss the 'cheating' element.

I have played online with married couples who have 2 computers 2 different in rooms (or even in the same room) who are able to discuss hands while in play, and I will admit to the time when I was so surprised by the bid or play made by a partner that I have called him/her on the phone while still online as a partner. I'm sure I'm not the only one...

Since I don't agree that there should be any points awarded for online bridge, I am totally in favor of separating points earned online from points earned at club games and tournaments and not counting online points for any award.

In fact, I suggest a new

award listing for online points only (if one doesn't already exist). As it stands now, a player who earns enough points to become a Life Master including online points should get a certificate which has an "*" denoting that fact (as used in sports statistics).

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21st Century methods for dealing with Interference over our 1NT opening bid using negative doubles and 3-level invitational transfers

By Marty Hirschman

(Note: Thanks to Ed Herstein and Jonathan Fleischmann for providing much of the material in this article. I am presenting a somewhat simplified, though not simple, version here.)

Introduction

We have our methods down pat when partner opens 1NT and the next player passes. But when RHO overcalls, it often takes us out of our comfort zone. The modern methods outlined below aim at making us feel at home again.

Old Methods

The traditional approach to dealing with overcalls of our 1NT opening is to play double as penalty, two of a new suit to play there, 2NT as competitive (about 7-9 HCPs), a bid of 3 of the opponent's suit as Stayman, and a non-jump bid of 3 of a new suit as competitive (somewhere between "just to play there" and invitational).

Lebensohl

The Lebensohl Convention, which became popular in the

last quarter of the 20th century, changed 2NT (after an overcall of 2♦, 2♥ or 2♠) into a relay to 3♣. After opener takes the relay, responder then either 1) passes 3♣, 2) bids a new suit, just to play there ("competitive"), 3) bids showing values 3NT, game with a stopper in the opponent's suit, or 4) bids 3 of the opponent's suit for Stayman with a stopper in the opponent's suit. If instead of bidding 2NT, responder directly bids three of a new suit, that is forcing, while cue-bidding the opponent's suit is Stayman without a stopper, and bidding 3NT directly over the overcall shows values for game without a stopper.

This was an improvement over the old methods, but left responder with few game-invitational auctions. Also, keeping double as penalty leaves responder at a competitive disadvantage in finding a playable fit with modest values (about 4+ to 8 HCPs).

Negative Doubles

We long ago gave up penalty doubles when we open one of a suit and the opponents

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overcall. Adopting negative doubles there solved all the problems we used to have competing with modest values and no long suit. The same advantages are available using negative doubles after partner opens 1NT and the next hand overcalls 2♦, 2♥, 2♠ or 3 of any suit. Double is for takeout, usually with 4 of the unbid major. and shows enough values to be comfortable forcing partner to bid at whatever level the auction is at.

Although we are giving up the penalty double, we sometimes will be able to punish the overcaller if we pass. Opener will reopen with a double with a healthy-looking hand and just two pieces in the opponent's suit. That's basically the same thing we do when partner opens one of a suit and the next player overcalls in a suit we would like to double for penalty.

We can still play Lebensohl to cover the single-suited "competitive" hands as well as the Stayman and 3NT hands, with or without a stopper, as set forth above.

Three-level Invitational Transfers

The remaining problem is the invitational hands with a 5+-card suit. This is now

solved by playing our threelevel new-suit bids as transfers to the next highest unbid suit, promising invitational or better values. Each such three-level new-suit bid transfers to the next suit up, except the suit below opponent's suit transfers to the suit above the overcalled suit. Opener takes the transfer if he has a minimum and therefore does not wish to play in game opposite invitational values. With extras, opener jumps to game in the suit shown by responder, bids 3NT or makes another bid in the absence of a stopper in opponent's suit.

If opener takes the transfer, showing a minimum, and responder actually has more than invitational values, he bids again, just as he would playing regular Jacoby Transfers.

Sample auctions

1NT (2♥) **Dbl** = Negative, usually with 4 spades and about 5 or more HCPs, but possibly any balanced 8-9

1NT (2♥) 2♠ = 5+ spades, to play

1NT (2♥) **2NT** = Lebensohl relay to 3♣ with some 5+-card suit and competitive values, or a stopper plus game-forcing values (see above)

1NT (2♥) 3♣ = Transfer to diamonds with 5+ diamonds and

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at least invitational values

1NT (**2♥**) **3♦** = Transfer to spades with 5+ spades and at least invitational values

1NT (2♥) 3♥ = Stayman without a heart stopper

1NT (2♥) 3♠ = 5+ clubs with at least invitational values

1NT (**2♥**) **3NT** = To play, but without a heart stopper

1NT (2♠) Dbl = Negative, usually with 4 hearts and 8+ HCPs, possibly any balanced 8-9

1NT (2♠) **2NT** = Lebensohl relay to 3♠ with some 5+-card suit and competitive values, or a stopper plus game-forcing values (see above)

1NT (2♠) **3**♠ = Transfer to diamonds with 5+ diamonds and at least invitational values

1NT (2♠) **3**♦ = Transfer to hearts with 5+ hearts and at least invitational values

1NT (2♠) **3♥** = 5+ clubs with at least invitational values

1NT (2♠) **3**♠ = Stayman without a spade stopper

1NT (2♠) **3NT** = To play, but without a spade stopper

1NT (2*) Dbl = Negative usually with at least one 4-card major and about 5 or more HCPs, possibly any balanced 8-9

1NT (2♦) 2♥ = To play

1NT (2♦) 2♠ = To play

1NT (2*) 2NT = Lebensohl, as above

1NT (2♦) 3♣ = Transfer to hearts

with 5+ hearts and at least invitational values

1NT (2♦) 3♦ = Stayman without a stopper in diamonds

1NT (2♦) 3♥ = Transfer to spades with 5+ spades and at least invitational values

1NT (2♦) 3♠ = 5+ clubs and at least invitational values

1NT (2♦) 3NT = to play, but without a diamond stopper

1NT (3 of a suit) Dbl = Negative, with at least 8 HCPs **1NT (3 of a suit) 3 of a suit** = 5+ of that suit, forcing

Odds and Ends

■All the above applies when the overcalled suit is natural, whether or not the bid promises a second suit.

■We still play Texas Transfers (4♦ to 4♥ and 4♥ to 4♠), on after interference through 3♣. If the overcall is 3♦, 4♦ is "pick a major" and 4 of a new major is to play.

■After a 2♣ overcall of 1NT, whether natural or artificial, double is Stayman. Other bids are what they would have been had there been no overcall.

■After a double of 1NT, redouble is a relay to 2♣ to play 2♣ or 2♦ with a weak hand and 5+ of that suit. Other bids are what they would have been had there been no double. ("Systems on.")

You have 8 tricks on top. It is tempting to play on clubs for the 9th, but there is a danger that the opponents will win a club trick and cash four hearts to beat you (if they are 4-2). Unfortunately, the auc-

tion has pinpointed this defense.

A better approach is to play on hearts, despite the lack of high cards there. Eventually you will score the 5th heart for the game-going trick.

This assumes that West's lead of the 9 of diamonds denies a higher card. If the opponents persist with diamonds, you will score your jack for the 9th trick.

In the unlikely event that the opponents play on clubs, you will be in no worse shape than you would have been playing on them yourself, and probably much better. Either you may pick up the suit for no losers or, if you've played two rounds of hearts and then have to lose a club, the defender you lose the club to may not have any more hearts to play.
